## **Important – Road Closure**

## **Change of Route Required**

Unfortunately on Sunday 15<sup>th</sup> May the ancient historic road bridge at Trewornan on the **B3314** between Wadebridge and Polzeath was severely damaged.

Cornwall Council have had **Trewornan Bridge** inspected and it is deemed to be unsafe presently so the **B3314** from Wadebridge going towards Rock & Polzeath is now **Closed** for the foreseeable future.

Many of you will be coming off the **A30** at the **Kennards House** Junction with the **B395** to **Davidstow** anyway and then crossing the **A39** to join the **B3314** at **Slaughter Bridge** which then brings you in to Polzeath on the coast road, **this won't alter for you, and you should continue to come this way.** 

For those of you who approach Cornwall on the A38 which would bring you in to Bodmin to take the A389 to Wadebridge, your route will change now at Washaway. You will need to take the B3266 from Washaway to Camelford where you will cross over the A39 back on to the B3266 which will take you to join the B3314 at Slaughter Bridge to come down the coast road to Polzeath.

You may be tempted to follow your Sat Nav and use the shorter routes down the narrow country lanes. We would strongly recommend that you don't do this, especially if you are towing a caravan or driving a large motorhome. Most of these small country lanes are single track and not designed to carry the volume of traffic that must be diverted.

Please allow extra time for your journey to Polzeath and for any day trips you may have planned during your stay.

We are sorry for the inconvenience caused and Cornwall Council will be working hard to get the bridge open again as a matter of priority, but it is possible this route will be closed for many weeks.
